CALLED, CHOSEN, AND FAITHFUL

Actually, all men are called. "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock," Christ says: "if any man hear My voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with Me."

This message is to all mankind; so it is safe to say all mankind is called. But it is obvious that not all choose to be chosen. Some have urgent business elsewhere legitimate business having to do with the vital activities of society: birth, death, marriage, the transfer of property.

The spiritual goal provides a substitute for each one of these practices. For the practice of birth, the birth of the Son of God in the core of the soul is recommended. "Let Christ be born in you."

Death is swallowed up in the victory of the Resurrection. So each one is advised to reckon himself to be dead unto sin and resurrected with Christ.

For marriage, the marriage of the Lamb is presented as highly desirable. "Come, and I will show you the bride of the Lamb," said the angel to John the Revelator.

Private ownership or transfer of property is so unimportant as to be completely negated by the command: Sell all you have, follow Me, have treasure in Heaven.

Although all God's children are called, the spiritual prerogatives are enjoyed by the ones who are chosen. And it is quite a thing to be chosen of the Lord. Such an experience caused one to cry in awe at the "terrible majesty of God." Another found himself to be "fearfully and wonderfully made."

Altogether, those who have been chosen of God have found themselves to have been inducted into an entirely new sense of being and state of consciousness. At first, the ones who are chosen for spiritual service feel like strangers in a strange land, and the land from which they have been chosen seems also to have changed. They are looked upon with suspicion by former friends and associates. Quickly they must learn to place their whole dependence in this new order - that they may not permit themselves to be judged by the unawakened, who have no conception of what is taking place in them.

During this transition period, each one must know, with Jesus, that men could have no power to judge him at all if it were not given them from on High. Then he must know that it is the fullness of time for him to make the particular demonstration for which he was brought into the world and brought to the place of judgment.

John wrote: "Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgment: because as He is, so are we in this world."

A day of judgment is the completion of a cycle. At each of these gorounds, one is called upon to stand up and be counted, to make his ever new decision as to whom he will serve and whether he will keep on in the way he has chosen. Sometimes these days of judgment come at times of crisis, when a man's extremity is God's opportunity.

We remember Jesus' saying: "If ye continue in My word, then are ye My disciples indeed: and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." To be free is to abide in the Spirit of the Lord, which is liberty; to be immune to all the machinations of self-seeking men; to be released from material bondage; to achieve the spiritual work for which your particular talent is designed.

Here is where each one finds he has a full-time job in expressing his own talent and cannot afford to scatter his forces by judging others. No one can do another's work; each one expresses his own talent for some specific purpose. Those who find their particular place in the complete pattern are the chosen - and they may be the faithful. The chosen are to be trained in the art of faith, and tested as to their faithfulness.

Even after the disciples were called and chosen by Jesus, there were many times when they failed to do the required works because of their little faith. When they murmured because they had no food Jesus said to them:

"O ye of little faith, why reason ye among yourselves, because ye have brought no bread? Do ye not yet understand, neither remember the five loaves of the five thousand and how many baskets ye took up? neither the seven loaves of the four thousand, and how many baskets ye took up?"

There is a constant training of the attention of all aspirants away from the lower and up to the Higher. This does not mean that everyone must join a monastery or take the veil; but that each one, right where he is, has the chance of being called, chosen, and faithful. Not everyone is called to the ministry.

Jesus found more faith outside Israel than in it. We find the same thing to be true today. I believe the so-called materialistic man, who uses the business methods he knows with the honest intention of making a profit, is closer to being chosen than the spiritual practitioner who uses malpractice for the same purpose: not to bring students to liberty, but to place them in bondage to the teacher for the sake of the profit the teacher may get from them.

We call one who uses physical superiority to subdue a weaker person a bully. We call one who uses personal will power a tyrant or dictator. But many who are subject to those who have knowledge of spiritual laws consider them as benefactors. Yet those who are using religious know-how to dominate others are emulating the conductors of concentration camps. This will get neither them nor the people into the land of promise and of liberty.

But if a spiritual leader has sufficient faith to live and even die for his cause, he will save himself and many others. Faith and fear are of the same school and work in similar manner. What we have faith in will come to pass, and what we fear will come upon us. This is why the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. For if we fear, or stand in awe of the Lord, the Lord will come upon us.

Sometimes the more fearful and helpless we feel, the more will the Lord be able to do for us. Fear is faith in reverse, and the fear of the Lord may become the faith that moves mountains.

The exercise of faith is not for the purpose of building up a personal dominance; but it is for the purpose of attending to, depending upon, and anticipating from, the Invisible One, who is "able to do exceeding - abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us."

It is good to recount the miracles of faith: the feeding of multitudes, raising the dead, healing diseases. But it is also good - in fact better - to know that these miracles are not confined to person or place; that the Doer of these deeds promised us that we too can do such things - and greater things than these, because He, our Elder Brother Jesus, has gone to our Friendly and Faithful Father.

THE LORD'S FAST

SOMETIMES in the mornings I see our neighbor, Mrs. Bybee, as she waters her garden and I water ours. She bemoans the weeds on her lot and I (with more justification) bemoan the weeds on ours. One morning she said, "You just have to close your eyes." And that is often the very best thing we can do. If we close our eyes to the weeds and give that same attention to God, the next time

we look at the lot the weeds will look less fearsome. Either they will seem unobjectionable (after all, what damage are they doing?) or we will see how to deal with them easily. The same principle works for all the problems that stare us in the face and seem so endless. Sometimes you just have to close your eyes.

Socrates said that the soul (or, consciousness) comes closest to Truth when it has the least possible commerce with the physical world. And so the philosopher (we would say "metaphysician") "flees from all but the necessary use of the eyes and ears." This reminds us of the words of Second Isaiah: "Who is blind but My servant, or deaf as My messenger whom I send? He sees many things, but does not observe them; his ears are open, but he does not hear." Both of these seers (Second Isaiah lived about 100 years before Socrates) knew that the less attention we give to the external world and the more attention we give to the Invisible God, the closer we come to Truth. For that which is seen is but a reflection of that which is unseen and eternal.

Socrates called the fleeing from all but the necessary use of the eyes and the ears "the practice of death." For the ordinary man (he said) identifies life with the senses and considers anyone who does not indulge them to the full to be as good as dead. This recalls the saying of Jesus: "He that findeth his life shall lose it: and he that loseth his life for My sake shall find it."

To turn our attention away from the weeds of this world (poverty, sickness, violence, unhappiness) and even the flowers (health, riches, etc.) so as to give that attention to the Lord - who is always with us - is the "fast" which God has chosen. "Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke?" Those who give their attention steadfastly to God, instead of to the clamoring world, are the channels through which these works are done. They are the peacemakers, the healers, the "light of the world."

The abbott Allois, one of the Desert Fathers, said: "Unless a man shall say in his heart, 'I alone and God are in this world,' he shall not find quiet." St. John of the Cross said: "Live in this world as though there were none in it but God and thy soul, so that thy heart may be detained by naught that is human."

Distinguish your goal from your purpose. Your goal beckons you outward. When you reach it you are finished. Your purpose draws your attention inward in such a way that you become aware of the reason for which you were created; namely, to be conscious of spiritual sonship to God through Jesus Christ. You choose your goal; God has already chosen your purpose.

Be willing to change your mind and your habits and you will have things as you wish.

We limit our demonstration of what we want by being unwilling to search into it long enough to penetrate the secrets that will make it yield its rewards.

Whatever we want is within reach of our attention.

All most persons ask is escape from trials. They would willingly turn back from Truth and again be submerged in dullness, futility, uselessness, rather than be hurt.

Have you made yourself ready for the abundance you pray for?

Most persons age; they do not mature.

"Ten thousand angels 'round His Throne rejoicing, rewarding some with gold and some with glory." -- Hesiod

O God, I pray; reward me with glory, though I know that it is the heavier burden.

Most of our demands on God are couched in terns of need.

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Neither the camera nor the film in it determine what pictures will be reproduced. They will reveal whatever objects they are pointed toward.

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When left alone, the faculty of attention moves in one direction only - toward God .
