Santa's laugh precedes the act of giving as though the gift itself were the effect of his mirth, much like thunder is the effect of a flash of lightning.

Everybody knows how good it is to be on the giving hand. Too, everybody understands the several degrees of giving that are in general practice in the world. One type of giving can be illustrated by the system incorporated in a public library. Any book given out must be returned on a certain date or a penalty is exacted. This kind of giving and the kind practiced by Santa are quite different. His gifts have no return date stamped upon them. His giving makes for joy, laughter, and freedom from responsibility or obligation.

Expressed joy is the motivating power identified with the Christmas spirit of giving. Just as Santa's merriment is infectious, the Christmas spirit is effective in every mind and heart. Its germs of joy are felt by all in the annual epidemic of good cheer, and there is no serum potent enough to retard or subdue such gleeful agents from accomplishing their mission of mirth. They must work fast and efficiently for their time is the holiday season, a comparatively brief period in the calendar year.

Even though the popular and powerful element of pessimism filters into humanity's heart, it undergoes such a transformation that it too joins in singing songs of joy in the reflected cadences of Christmas carols and the ever popular melody of Jingle Bells.

He comes in where angels fear to tread; yea, where angels would never think of going, even to habitations where angels themselves would be unwelcome. Santa has laughed his way into and out of situations even arch-angels would find difficult to cope with; but then, archangels do not laugh.

Dark shadows cut deeply into the fabric of existence giving the effect of sorrow, grief, trial, loss, and a sense of separation from whatever we love and cherish. In this semi-light men hate each other, binding all in the limitations of their faulty vision. The more attention man gives to shadows the more do

they take on a substantial quality furnished only by his earnest gaze toward them.

Thus the land, where the light is as darkness, becomes the habitual dwelling place of the majority of mankind. In this land a person wants to be let alone so that he may contemplate at leisure his favorite shadow (death) for in it he believes he will find liberation from the trials and tribulations of the world.

In the eerie dwelling place into which man casts the attention of his mind, he longs for light but beholds obscurity. He stumbles at noonday through desolate places. He declares lies against his Lord. Out of his heart he utters false words, speaking of oppression, revolt, sin, transgressions, and iniquities. In the semi-light of hallucinatory perception man declares that all he apprehends is the reality and whatever cannot be discerned through his senses is unreal.

The reverse is true. The senses, gathering their information from the world of form, make false reports. There is a Light beyond the seen that burns ever bright. Though it be dimmed to the point of extinction, it cannot be put out. Man may put off his day of attention toward it a thousand-thousand years, but it will remain ready to flare forth in all its effulgent glory the moment it is heeded.

The strength and power of the Light that lies at the core of man's being was demonstrated in the world through the advent of Jesus Christ. His inner eye ever beheld the true Light. In that Light he healed the sick, cast out demons, and raise the dead.
