To make the statement, Man is without care, is to invite dispute for every person appears to carry a burdensome sense of responsibility. In every day affairs the experience of a disquieting sense of oppression influences every waking hour and it is evident that a number of persons give serious attention of mind to their problems during the night when they should be enjoying complete rest which is the fruit of repose.

Part-statement from Hebrews 13:5, "Be content with such things as ye have," arouses challenge. Sermons and lessons based upon this text have led to many misconceptions. As students of truth we shall do well to investigate the inner meaning of the text rather than attempt to reconcile ourselves to it literally.

Just what do we have? An answer based upon standards of the world includes shelter, food, clothing, social relationships, and work; or, lack of these.

Does any one actually have such things? Does not one rather enjoy them as privileges, as forms of good common to all mankind to share instead of to hold in possession or control? A simple analogy to this proposition is the relation of all mankind to the air. All share it together every instant.

Another side to our question is: Do we actually have that which can be wiped out in a few moments or even a few days? A business man loses his printing establishment valued at \$10,000. An enterprising woman fails to conduct her tea-room successfully and has to close her doors. People lose homes; consume food; purchase, wear, and discard clothing; separate from family and friends; lose or change jobs: or, after a life time of work, fail to realize anything on their investments or for their efforts. All, whether much or little, that man can amass seems to disappear into the realm of nothingness.

Does any one have any thing that fades eventually into the nowhere? Can any one legitimately expect to assume an air of contentment with such will-othe-wisps? Forcing himself to be has caused poverty, anxiety, distress, and a multitude of maladjustments.

Just what do we have? We have whatever we can retain. Very little insight is necessary to understand that we do not retain the things that appear. Fortunately, we do hold secure something that out pictures as ability to possess for use any good essential to happy living in the world. That something enables us to continue to have, again and again, those mundane things that bear witness to our grasp on Itself. That something is the Foundation Principle of Good which is the Source whence all things come, and to which we can look and receive from.

All of us are aware of the primary essentials of the Principle: life, love, intelligence, substance. These are the things we have, the things we can keep, the things we can possess, and demonstrate as qualities or as material things.

We should be content with such things as these for they can satisfy our pleasure at any time. Understanding this our conversation is without covetousness for we know that all can have and enjoy the fullness of God at the same time.

The only contentment results from an ability to contain and retain all the blessings God has already poured out upon us, all of which demonstrate as unusual care. Man is cared for though he himself is without care. God takes care of man, "for He hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee."
