PAUL'S LETTER TO THE ROMANS

NOTE on the translation: Those who are familiar with the Letter to the Romans may feel that I have taken unjustified liberties in my translation. I have rendered nomos by "religion," rather than "law"; Iudaioi by "religious," rather than "Jews"; ethne by "irreligious" or "all men," rather then "Gentiles." I know of no other way to translate Paul's meaning.

For nomos, "law" is an entirely inadequate rendering. For a Jew of the First Century, nomos (or, in Hebrew, torah) meant not only the Scripture; but, by extension, the entire Jewish approach to God and to other men, based on their understanding of their Scripture. It included the ideas about God, the Temple rites, the Sabbath, etc. In other words, it embraced their theology, their ritual, and their code of conduct. There is no other word for this than "religion." And what Paul says specifically of the Jewish religion, because he was a Jew, is true of all religions.

The most important fact about the Jews was not that they were a certain people living in a certain area, but that they were a religious people. was their most outstanding characteristic, which distinguished them from all other people. So it is reasonable to translate Iudaioi as "religious." And for the Jews, Gentiles were simply all other people, who were, in their eyes, irreligious. For them, the words Iudaioi and ethne certainly had the connotations of "religious" and "irreligious."

Paul's letter has lived through the ages and moved men of many nations and many eras precisely because the truths that he writes are eternal truths. They are not bound to a particular time and place in history. We may remember his warning to the Corinthians: "God has made us able ministers of the New Covenant - not of the letter (the literal understanding of the Scripture), but of the spirit; for the letter kills, but the spirit gives life."

My translation and commentary of Chapter Four of the Letter follow; the translation is indented.

What shall I say that Abraham (our forefather according to the flesh) discovered? If Abraham was declared good because of religious observations, he had cause for self-satisfaction. But No! - not before God. For what does the Scripture say? "Abraham believed in God, and this was accounted to him as goodness."

For him who works, his pay is not accounted as a gift, but as his due. For him who does not work, but believes in Him who declares the irreligious innocent, his faith is accounted as goodness. So David mentions the good fortune of the man to whom the Lord imputes goodness apart from any religious observation:

"Fortunate are all whose transgressions are canceled, whose mistakes are buried; fortunate is the man to whom the Lord does not impute error." . . .

We say faith was accounted to Abraham as goodness. How was it so accounted? When he was circumcised? or when he was still uncircumcised? It was not when he was circumcised, but when he was still uncircumcised. He received the sign of circumcision as an indication of the goodness of faith that he had while still uncircumcised. And so he became the father (1) of all the uncircumcised who believe, so that their belief should be accounted to them as goodness; and (2) of all the circumcised who are not only circumcised, but also follow the path that our father Abraham blazed while he was still uncircumcised.

For the promise to Abraham and his descendants that they would inherit the earth did not come through religious observances, but through the goodness of belief. If those only who observe the religious obligations are heirs, faith is of no avail and the promise is void of meaning.

Religion produces Wrath. But where there in no religion, there is no transgression. So the promise is received by belief; it is a gift. It stands firm for all the descendants of Abraham - not only those who are of his religion, but also those who have his faith. He is the father of us all (as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations"). . . .

Abraham kept on hoping and believing. So he became the father of many peoples, in accordance with the promise, so will your descendants be. . . . "He did not grow weak in faith when he saw his own body as good as dead, for he was a hundred years old, and when he saw the deadness of Sarah's womb. He did not despise the promise of God by disbelief. But he grew strong in faith; he ascribed power to God. This was accounted to as goodness.

It was written not for his sake alone that it was so accounted to him, but also for our sake. Our faith also will be accounted to us as goodness, if we believe in Him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead. For He was betrayed for our mistakes and raised up for our acquittal.

To keep his presentation of the Gospel from sounding too abstract or wishful or impractical, Paul points to an example his readers were familiar with. Then as now, one valid example was worth ten thousand words. His choice of Abraham as an example was of course dictated by his own upbringing and by the audience he was addressing, which was predominantly Jewish. But he could hardly have found a better example (unless he had chosen himself).

Today we don't give much thought to Abraham; yet, in a real sense, he is the father of us all (and modern archaeology is confirming the accuracy of the Biblical account of him).

By our modern standards, Abraham (who lived about 1850 B.C.) is not an outstandingly impressive figure. He was a princeling (the Greek Old Testament calls him a "king") - one of the many living in Asia Minor and the area of the Aegean in the Second Millennium B.C. He was a nomad shepherd, a merchant, and the head of a large clan, including 318 soldiers. He was wealthy, but was not in the same class as the great kings of Sumer and Egypt. Yet today, 2800 years later, he alone of all his contemporaries is well known.

The great kings of Egypt and Sumer sought to perpetuate their memory by all the resources of religious and political power, backed by fabulous wealth; today they are all but forgotten names, known only to a small handful of students. But Abraham, who simply had faith in God, is revered by half the world: by Jews, Moslems, and Christians. He is the spiritual father of us all. And so the promise in which he believed has been fulfilled: "I will make you the father of many nations."

Abraham's profitable religious practice consisted not in being circumcised (today this would be "Baptized," "confirmed," etc.), but in believing that God would do what He had promised to do. Abraham kept on believing, even when the promise was "impossible" of fulfillment. He received the fulfillment, and all the nations of the world have been blessed by what he did.

So again Paul emphasizes that whatever we want is a gift of God which we receive by having faith in the Giver - and by enduring in that faith. But this truth is so simple that most people reject it. It is unwelcome (1) because it robs a man of self-importance; (2) because its simplicity fails to satisfy the intellect, which delights in complexity; and (3) because people want something visible (a rite, an institution, etc.) to cling to. This is why Paul repeats his instruction over and over, enforcing it with every example he can lay his hands on.

Paul's expression is sometimes involved, but his thought is simple. The Jews of his day trusted in circumcision and observance of the Mosaic Law to bring them into God's favor, as today we trust in baptism, confirmation, attendance at church, Holy Communion, and charity. Paul points to Abraham who won God's favor by believing in Him, and only later received circumcision as an indication of his status with God. His standing with God derived from his belief, and depended upon it only. And so it is. In reality, everyone is in God's favor always. Each one enters consciously into this state by believing in the already established reality of it. This is what Paul is saying.

"Thou art My beloved son in whom I am well pleased" is God's message to everyone. We will hear this message if we believe in the Good News. "Only believe," Jesus Christ said, "He that believes in Me has everlasting life."

GOD'S MAN IS NOT ANXIOUS

FOR CERTAIN types of people life is one continuous conflict. These are as yet under Law, but may use the Law under which they live to prepare them for their spiritual release from the Law. "For the Law made nothing perfect, but the bringing in of a better hope did, by the which we draw nigh unto God."

We have all been born under Law and will be subject to the Law until we begin to demand and exercise the spiritual Freedom we are all entitled to as sons of God. The best way to make this transition is through the practice of praise, thanksgiving, and appreciation for all the manifest blessings enjoyed even under the Law. We do observe the effects of different attitudes of mind, to find praise yielding a happier, more tranquil life than criticism does.

As we look through the record of history to find constant conflict building up into the warring of nations, we see how every misuse of our creature equipment creates havoc. We see these struggles go on until the warring members are exhausted by their own efforts - depleted of their own powers - to be hospitalized until strong enough to break out again.

Probably in each extremity some persons learn to turn back to the one and only Source of freedom from fear. It does seem to be but a token turning. But if one can turn, a million may do so. And if the million turn to Christ, the multitudes will follow.

We have seen mystical science, or Christ Truth, triumph in actual warfare. We had no gold-star mothers among our people. And now conscientious spiritual workers are praying, in Spirit and in Truth, for the leaders of the free world.

We know spiritual work is effective - if for no other reason than that the world always turns to its mystics in times of emergency.

We have come through hot wars and cold wars. Surely THAT which has brought us through can be depended upon to carry us on up - wherever IT is going. Here, we will have gone beyond the point of no return. Here, we will have abandoned hope. Here, we will have been bought with a price. We will have traded in our old mortal ideas for our God-given sonship. We know not what we will be, but we know we will be as God has made us to be, when we are established in Him.

It is quite possible we will be anxious when we are off-center, or eccentric; for then there is a good reason for being anxious. We know we are not where we should be. We might have everything our friends think we should have - status, securities, and all the things acceptable to society at large. But if we are off base, we are worried. Although nothing can injure the immaculate soul, it will be uneasy when obliged to depend upon less than God. Thus we hear the wise Psalmist telling his soul, "Wait thou only upon God."

When Jesus gave the Parable of the Lilies to illustrate the unfoldment of man from one state of being to another, He said, "Consider the lilies of the fields how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin: and yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these."

Let us than consider the lily, and particularly how it grows. Most of us know the lily comes from a bulb. We know also that the bulb must be planted, preferably in good soil; that, once it is planted, there is little we can do about it except to weed, irrigate, and fertilize it. It is God - or Nature in this case - that does the growing. Nature does the growing; God gives the increase.

Today, at this time, do we need or want for anything? Do we hunger or thirst for any good thing? Well, this is the time we worried about at some previous time. We can see that, regardless of our worries, God had the situation well in hand.

When we choose God for our Way of Life, we are going to be well taken care of, regardless of our lack of faith; for even though we forget God, God remembers us.

How many times have you gotten up in the morning, feeling, "The morn is at seven, the earth is dew-pearled; God's in His Heaven, all's right with the world" - only to pick up the morning paper and see the headlines proclaiming an entirely different state of affairs? Here is our ever-present choice. Which of these reports do you prefer? Which do you feel obliged to subscribe to: the headlines in the morning paper or the heart lines from your inner communication

with the Heart of God? Could we simplify the idea, and say our choice is between the headlines and the heartlines?

Anxiety is caused by lack of balance, or stability. This is why Jesus advised us, as it were, to get back on balance, much as a coach will tell a baseball player to get back on base. As long as the player stays on base, there is no danger of his being tagged out. So the Truth teaches us how to play the game of life without being put out. As long as anyone plays the game according to the rules, he has no anxiety. Rather does he have a sort of professional attitude which knows when and how to take advantage of the breaks. He has a stability, a substantiality, in which there is the confidence and the audacity noticeable in any good player of any game. This is the Love of God casting out all fear.

If a man will forget himself, he will be cared for, supplied, and protected by the Creator, who is responsible for all creation, for every creature.

"Hear the word of the Lord, . . . As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you; and ye shall be comforted."
